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Abstract

This report synthesises findings from 10 peer-reviewed papers addressing the following research question: To what extent do tabular foundation models pretrained on synthetic adversarial data maintain performance advantages when fine-tuned and evaluated on cross-domain tabular datasets like those in the. 10 claims were extracted from source literature; 0 were independently verified against retrieved documents. 1 Introduction
