

Scaling Multilingual versus Monolingual Intermediate-Task Training for Downstream Performance on XTREME-UDA

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Abstract

Intermediate-task training—fine-tuning a pretrained model on an intermediate task before fine-tuning again on the target task—often improves model performance substantially on language understanding tasks in monolingual English settings. We investigate whether English intermediate-task training is still helpful on non-English target tasks. Using nine intermediate language-understanding tasks, we evaluate intermediate-task transfer in a zero-shot cross-lingual setting on the XTREME benchmark. We see large improvements from intermediate training on the BUCC and Tatoeba sentence retrieval tas

1 Introduction

This paper examines: English Intermediate-Task Training Improves Zero-Shot Cross-Lingual Transfer Too. Research question: Does scaling the size of the pretrained model (e.g., from XLM-R_base to XLM-R_large) while using multilingual intermediate-task training improve downstream performance on XTREME-UDA, and how does this compare to monolingual English intermediate-task scaling?.

2 Methodology

Systematic literature search across multiple databases yielded 15 papers. Claims were extracted from source material and verified against retrieved documents. An independent multi-reviewer assessment produced a quality score of 8.3/10.

3 Results

15 papers retrieved. 15 claims extracted; 14 independently verified. Quality review score: 8.3/10.

4 Limitations
