

Scaling Laws and Few-Shot Accuracy in Tabular Foundation Models

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Abstract

This report synthesises findings from 10 peer-reviewed papers addressing the following research question: How does model size scaling affect the few-shot accuracy of tabular foundation models when pretrained on varying volumes of synthetic data, compared to traditional baselines, using metrics like AUC. 11 claims were extracted from source literature; 0 were independently verified against retrieved documents. An automated multi-reviewer quality assessment produced a score of 3.5/10. This report is a machine-generated literature synthesis and does not constitute original research.

1 Introduction

2 Methodology
