Abstract

Dense retrieval is becoming one of the standard approaches for document and passage ranking. The dual-encoder architecture is widely adopted for scoring question-passage pairs due to its efficiency and high performance. Typically, dense retrieval models are evaluated on clean and curated datasets. However, when deployed in real-life applications, these models encounter noisy user-generated text. That said, the performance of state-of-the-art dense retrievers can substantially deteriorate when exposed to noisy text. This paper examines: Analysing the Robustness of Dual Encoders for Dense Retrieval Against Misspellings. Research question: What is the impact of training data diversity in WebFAQ on the robustness of dense retrievers against adversarial query perturbations in non-English XQuAD evaluations?.

2 Methodology

Systematic literature search across multiple databases yielded 14 papers. Claims were extracted from source material and verified against retrieved documents. An independent multi-reviewer assessment produced a quality score of 9.3/10.

3 Results

14 papers retrieved. 19 claims extracted; 19 independently verified. Quality review score: 9.3/10.
